Speed Limits - Twenty is Plenty

There have been many attempts over the years to establish a 20mph limit right through the village and as the traffic between Milton Malsor and the A45 increases, the need becomes greater. The problem has always been the cost and complexity of the signage measures demanded by local authorities. Now that government policy is to encourage 20mph in residential areas many parishes are pushing for simpler and cheaper traffic calming schemes. A campaign by a charity group 20splentyforus.co.uk argues that all that is needed are 20mph signs at the entry and exit points to the village and small repeater signs on lamp posts and possibly road markings – humps and bumps are not a requirement. This would be a low cost solution with no costly engineering works to disrupt and deface the village. Hopefully the Parish Council will be able to pursue this with the County Council.

Parking Mad

It is difficult to work out exactly, what Northamptonshire County Council (NCC) are planning to do with the fields they own alongside Watering Lane. After stating that they were seeking a new agricultural tenant (there are several farmers who wish to cultivate it) it emerges that they are still trying to persuade Silverstone to rent it as a Park and Ride on Race Days. How the traffic access would be managed, has not been explained. Silverstone has told local MP Andrea Leadsom, that they are not the instigators on this. The local County Councillor and Collingtree Parish Council are being kept in the dark and meanwhile, the fields are becoming derelict and weed infested - much to the annoyance of adjoining allotment gardeners and local residents.

Collingtree/East Hunsbury Expansion Plan

There has been no further news following the Public Examination hearings in March into the Expansion Plan

that would allocate 1000 houses on the farmland between East Hunsbury and Collingtree. The Inspector's report is expected in the Summer. Similarly, there has been no further word on the Bovis planning applications on the same site. There has been however increasing opposition nationally to the number of housing developments planned on Greenfield sites and more calls from bodies like the National Trust, to make more use of vacant brownfield land in urban centres.

Toms Close

There is still uncertainty over the long term intentions of the Borough Council regarding Toms Close. Occupiers of the houses – some public some private – have been told that the cost of necessary improvements is prohibitive and that the site must be cleared. Communication with residents by NBC has been patchy. The high estimated cost of bringing the houses up to the governments 'decent homes standard' has been questioned. The assumption is that NBC will eventually dispose of the site to a developer. Until a planning application for development of the site showing number of houses proposed and therefore the traffic to be generated, is submitted, the impact on the village will not be known.

Watch your step

Irresponsible owners, who allow their dogs to foul public walkways, are worse than a nuisance The latest reported 'blackspot' is the pavement on Windingbrook Lane (close to the entrance to the Nursing Home) which according to residents, is fouled almost daily. Offenders should be aware that if identified, they face a possible fine of £1000, payable by them – not their dog.

The Annual Parish Meeting open to all parish electors was held at the Village Room on 23rd April. Issues of concern included uncertainty over NBC proposals for Toms Close, NCC plans for the fields on Watering Lane and traffic speeds through the village. Minutes of the meeting will be placed in notice boards and copies can be obtained from the Clerk (see above).

Parish Councils are the most local tier of local governance and in Collingtree the PC has direct responsibility for services such as some street lighting and the management of the playing field.

It must also be consulted on a range of planning and highway proposals that affect the parish and is able to raise money through a local tax (precept) for projects that benefit its residents.

Following a review in 2010, changes were made to the boundaries between the Nene Valley and East Hunsbury wards to equalise the number of electors. As a result the Collingtree Parish is divided between the two wards with the 'Collingtree North' (Collingtree Park) section coming under East Hunsbury ward and 'Collingtree South (the original Village) remaining in Nene Valley ward. There continues to be 7 members of the

Parish Council, with 3 from the north and 4 from the south.

Conservation Area

The centre of the old village was designated as a Conservation Area in 1978. The intention is to preserve the history and character of the High Street and adjoining areas, the 10 listed buildings and the unique layout of boundary walls and the use of local stone .Conservation Area status, gives the local authority the power to control changes to windows and other external features.

Since then the EU has become a very different structure with its own parliament, anthem, flag, currency, space programme and foreign policy.
