

NEW TRICKS FOR OLD CHURCHES

Traditional attitudes and assumptions that were once taken for granted are disappearing.

Our culture is changing and Christian Churches have to change with it – fast.

That doesn't mean changing the message, which is timeless and sacred, it means changing the methods through which a church connects with the people of its parish.

Parish churches were originally, the centre of their community. The chancel was reserved for worship but the nave was used for many purposes including drama, elections, public meetings and school classrooms. It was the Victorians at the height of the religious revival, who reclaimed the whole of church building for purely sacred purposes. In the last 50 years many churches have started to see their building as a practical asset in connecting with local people who may not want to come inside for worship. In some rural areas the church is the only focal point as local schools, post offices, shops and pubs disappear.

The Church of England has long accepted that a church building can have a variety of uses as long as its primary purpose as a place of worship remains and there is no conflict with Christian teaching. Some churches are already being used as libraries, outreach post offices, extra school classrooms and concert halls.

Contrary to what many people believe, the responsibility for maintaining and repairing each church lies with the local incumbent and each Parochial Church Council. There is no guaranteed state funding and the Church of England has no central funds. So 'Use it or lose it' is the watchword.

A Grade 2 listed Church in St Alban's was faced with closure. By keeping the chancel for worship and opening up the nave for community uses, it has turned itself around. The pews have been taken out, a wooden floor put in and a small kitchen and toilet installed at the base of the tower. The local primary school now uses it as their hall. It provides a venue for a playgroup, youth group, IT learning, festivals and concerts. The changes have made it the physical centre of the village as well as the spiritual and social centre too.

St Columba's has made a promising start. With the help of the recently formed 'Friends of St Columba's' fundraising group, many improvements to the building have been made – including cushioned seating for the pews to make them more suit-

able for events such as 'Words & Music' and some of the musical events that are planned.

But the PCC wants to go further in making the building more flexible and is exploring possible options.

In the end it is for Collingtree parish to decide what is best for its church. Each generation is only the custodian of a building that has been around for 900 years – which is why the views of everyone in the parish who values St Columba's, are important.

Options for a more 'Open Church'

Subject to the agreement of the Church Authorities and obtaining the necessary funding, Collingtree PCC are considering possible changes to the facilities within St Columba's.

- Creating space at the rear of the church by replacing some pews with stackable chairs.
- Use of space by community groups for meetings, Coffee mornings etc.
- Moving the Font to the front of the church for better visibility at Christening services and creating more space at the
- Installation of a Servery Cabinet (possibly in the Bell Tower) to contain a small sink unit and storage for crockery.
- Installation of a toilet at the rear of the church The location to be dictated by plumbing requirements and as agreed with the Diocese.


